

More Than Contractors: NHOs Are The Cultural Force Behind Pacific Security

Baghdad Iraq: During the height of ISIS's invasion into Iraq in 2016, I served as the U.S. Ambassador's Senior Advisor to Iraq's Minister and Chief of Defense. In Iraq's tribal society, trust isn't given—it's earned through shared experience, respect, and humility.

That came naturally to me. Growing up in the rural community of Kaʻū on the Big Island of Hawaii, I was raised with the belief that your word is your bond, relationships are built on authenticity, and true strength is measured through service—not status.

As descendants of Native Hawaiian warriors, the people of Kaʻū carry a legacy of guardianship and toughness—shaped by the district's rugged terrain and isolation. It's a legacy rooted in humility, loyalty, and service. That foundation gave me the ability to build trust and navigate complex relationships in Iraq—skills that directly apply to the strategic challenges **we now face across the Pacific**.

Native Hawaiian Organizartions (NHO) I founded the Mālama Ka'ū Foundation to give back to the place that made me. But our mission goes beyond my hometown. Native Hawaiian Organizations like ours are more than nonprofits or 8(a) contractors—we are trusted connectors in the Pacific, especially with our South Pacific 'ohana. In a region where trust is earned, not granted, we bring cultural fluency and strategic relationships that matter.



<u>Warrior Ethos:</u> Native Hawaiian culture is a warrior culture. We are protectors, navigators, and defenders of our 'āina and people. **This warrior ethos is in our DNA**. It shaped how I earned the trust of senior Iraqi leaders and built durable partnerships in a high-stakes combat zone.

This same ethos is what the Department of Defense needs in the Pacific region today. Native Hawaiian Organizations (NHO), led by Native Hawaiian board members, carry a unique blend of cultural fluency and mission-driven purpose. We can speak the language of both diplomacy and readiness. We understand the Pacific not just geographically, but spiritually.

Building Trust Across Oceans: In Kaʻū, when conflict arises, we turn to hoʻoponopono — a sacred practice of reconciliation and healing. In Baghdad, hoʻoponopono became my guide for building trust with the Iraqi military leadership. It wasn't about imposing our will, but about restoring balance, resolving tensions, and building lasting relationships.

That same approach can be applied across the South Pacific—to **Tonga**, **Samoa**, **Fiji**, **and our other Pacific 'ohana**. These are not transactional relationships. They require cultural respect and deep commitment. NHOs, through **Native Hawaiian** board leadership, are uniquely equipped to serve as trusted partners and connectors.

In many South Pacific nations, China is expanding influence by building infrastructure and offering financial support. **But what China lacks is aloha.** NHOs bring what money can't buy: authentic, culturally grounded relationships that support stability and defense readiness.

Our value lies in trust—the trust we build with warfighters, the trust we foster across oceans, and the trust we uphold with our own people.

<u>A Call to Arms.</u> To my fellow Native Hawaiian board members: our time is now. Military readiness in the Pacific requires more than winning DoD contracts, delivering equipment and logistics—it requires deep, authentic relationships. We are stewards of that responsibility. We must step up as Native Hawaiians, not in competition to line our pockets with kālā (money), but in culture, diplomacy, and leadership.

Let us use our platforms as NHOs to protect not just Hawai'i, but our South Pacific 'ohana. Let us demonstrate that readiness begins with trust, and trust begins with those who live the culture.

The warrior ethos lives on. And it lives in us.
